Executive Summary

With 11 smallholders taken as samples, we noted the general awareness on commitment toward improving productivity by adhering to Group Manager's advice and recommendation on good agricultural practices. Some are evidently restricted by limited financial resources while some appeared to have enjoyed good economic return especially those practicing integrated activities. It is worth to note that all the smallholders are supportive and eager to participate in the management system toward sustainability through MSPO. This is shown by another group of 50 smallholders joining in as SPOC members since the last audit.

Commitment shown both by the Group Manager and the smallholders toward MSPO is evident through a signed letter of participation and establishment of communication initiated by the Group Manager to monitor the performances of the smallholders.

Improvement plans are very much up to the initiative of the Group Manager. Talks are organised to communicate new ways and technology to be considered by smallholders to improve work methods. Bulletin containing news and research information are given away to smallholders to get them abreast with recent event and agricultural practices. It was noted that the involvement of government agencies to give talks to smallholders as part of educational and continuous improvement plans was supported only by the Wildlife Department's.

While smallholders understand the need to maintain proper records through a book 'Buku Rekod Ladang' given by the Group Manager, not all of them were able to do so. They are required by the Group

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Manager to submit or communicate information on their total sales for the month which was also not fully done.

Without any party to collect scheduled waste from smallholders, we were told through admission of some smallholders that they disposed their waste by burning them. However, there is general awareness among them toward the need of legal compliance. All the smallholders are either in possession of land titles or in the process of obtaining title from the authority. They all were able to identify and show their boundaries and there was no issue of any dispute over their land between neighbours.

The Group Manager besides acting as advisors on agriculture practices also assists in providing aids and supplies of agrochemicals and even seedlings to the smallholders. The Group Manager received complaints from smallholders and addressed them following their internal procedures. Records show that grievances and complaints are resolved and recorded. Smallholders were given awareness briefing on safety and health including usage of proper PPE.

Farms are mostly managed as family-owned and workers are mostly family members. Where outsiders are engaged as casual workers, it is done under mutual agreement. These workers are either neighbours or are likely also to be relatives. They are paid according to their agreement. However, there is a need for both parties to keep records of their understanding through written and signed agreement.

Smallholders show general awareness toward obtaining and preferring the best prices available within their area to sell their fruits. However they have no choice except to send their crop to the nearest collection centre to save cost on transport. A corporative (Koperasi) consisting of smallholders is now running and also is to look into the issue of buying crops from the smallholders.
